Welcome to CISS's Summer 2023 Newsletter.

The last few weeks of term, leading up to the summer holiday is one of the busiest times of year in our schools. I appreciate how much you will be looking forward to a relaxing and reinvigorating summer break.

I have been working as a Professional Development Officer with CISS since the summer of 2020. It is an exciting and fulfilling role with lots of innovative projects running at different times, all with the common theme of supporting schools in their delivery of Mandarin language and culture.

I split my time between working for CISS and teaching in schools in my Local Authority area of Stirling. As a teacher of Primary Mandarin, I have the privilege of visiting many different schools and I can see just how hard teachers and school staff are working, particularly at this hectic and exhausting time of year.

For all of us, the past year has involved implementing lessons learned during the pandemic and settling back into a sustainable way of working after the huge disruption of the previous couple of years.

For CISS, this means hybrid working, with staff located across Scotland taking advantage of the technological advances necessarily imposed on us all during the pandemic.

These changes have also had a huge impact on how Mandarin language is taught in our schools. Our Virtual Exchange Teachers, based at South West Jiao Tong University in Chengdu, are about to complete their sixth block of online lessons in Scottish primary classrooms, live from China, while CISS's Mandarin teachers, Minrong Zhang and Xiaoyan Zhou continue their development and delivery of the online Discovering China programme, supporting Mandarin learning in High Schools includina National Qualifications.

Last summer, we welcomed seven of our former Virtual Exchange Teachers to Scotland to teach in person in schools across the country. Their previous experience of online teaching in Scotland along with the accompanying professional Learning offered by CISS, proved to be an excellent introduction to our Education system and went a long way in preparing them for what they would find once they set foot in a Scottish classroom.

We will be sad to say goodbye to our Chinese Exchange Teachers this summer as most of them return to Tianjin and Chengdu after either one or two years teaching in our schools. We have been getting excellent reports about just how well they have adapted to their roles and we are sorry to see them go. We are looking forward to welcoming a new group of CETs for the beginning of the 2023/24 session.

AN ADVENTURE WITH PANDAS

On Wednesday 19th April 2023, in celebration of the UN Chinese Language Day 2023, CISS partnered with RZSS and Southwest Jiaotong University to present An Adventure with Pandas marking the return of Edinburgh Zoo's giant pandas back to China.

Over 5000 Pupils joined the online event from all across Scotland, with over 90 schools in 18 Local Authorities taking part. During An Adventure With Pandas, pupils took a virtual tour of the Chengdu panda park with panda specialists, saw inside Edinburgh Zoo's panda enclosure, learnt some panda related Chinese characters and took part in our online quiz.

Our Mandarin Teacher Xiaoyan Zhou gave a mini Mandarin lesson with games and an introduction to Chinese characters.

DISCOVERING CHINA MEET UP

Our Discovering China pupils and their schoolteachers travelled from different areas across Scotland to Glasgow on 11th May during their exam leave. This was their first time visiting their Mandarin teachers in person who have been teaching them online throughout the year. The one-day event consisted of an abundance of cultural activities and drew the 22/23 Discovering China National Qualification classes to a perfect end.

The group first visited the Burrell Collection where they saw Chinese art. With guidance from Mrs Zhang, they traced the artistic development of China from the Neolithic period to the Qing dynasty and experienced the ancient civilisations in person.

The arts of Buddhism, Daoism and Confucianism, ceramics and porcelains from Qing Dynasties, Chinese drinking culture history...all of these intrigued our Mandarin learners greatly. 'Oh, San cai (three-color glazed pottery)! This must be from Tang Dynasty'. Our NQ pupils guessed the dynasty based on the features of one relic and they were correct!

After the trip to the Burrell Collection, our pupils had a fantastic time at The Ramshorn, in the heart of Glasgow's city-centre and home to SCILT/CISS. They tried out Chinese calligraphy, face mask designs and jianzi (shuttlecocks) that had been introduced through our online courses. The environmentally friendly way of using reusable paper and water (as ink) amazed both teachers and pupils.



After displaying their artistry, they enjoyed the tea ceremony with Mrs Zhou, who introduced how the Minnan word for tea was used as the source and adapted for multiple lanauaaes accordingly. Everyone tried the tea Mrs Zhou made with authentic Chinese snacks - food and drink is an important part of the culture, of course this wouldn't be excluded! Trying on Chinese traditional costumes was an exciting experience for all our visitors. Our pupils from across different areas of Scotland dressed in clothing from different dynasties. They hit it off immediately.

Mrs Bell, Discovering China's Secondary course leader, Professional Development Officer from SCILT awarded our learners certificates along with small gifts in recognition of their hard work throughout the year. All the nongraduates will continue to do Mandarin with us next year.

I would like to use a saying by Confucius to conclude the summary of our day - A visit by a friend from afar is truly a delight (有朋自远方来,不亦乐乎). Our learners from different levels gathered together and celebrated their learning and achievement. We would like to congratulate all of them!

THE HAPPINESS OF A MANDARIN TEACHER

"A teacher is the most glorious profession under the sun!"

The progress of human society is inseparable from hard-working people from all professions. People who are inspired by teachers who are equally enthusiastic and dedicated about educating people. To say the least; I feel extremely happy because I am a teacher.

For me, nothing can surpass the delight brought about from seeing the faces of students breaking out into smiles upon acquiring understanding. Happiness lies in the knowledge that students have embarked on the industry they hoped for, followed by their expansion of knowledge, as well as the influence and cultivation of the spirit.

I am beyond grateful to be a Chinese teacher in Scotland. CISS provides school pupils in Scotland the opportunity to learn Chinese online through the Discovering China course. These pupils would otherwise not have access to a Mandarin teacher and through the course, they can learn Chinese and take its SQA exam. I am immensely proud to be part of this project.

I feel blessed to have met such lovely students through the Discovering China course; students who have won Chinese speaking awards and students who are going on to University to study languages such as Chinese, French and German in September. Would it not bring immeasurable feelings of delight, to see so many budding linguists with such promising futures?

I feel happy because these past three years, I've taught a student who has overcome all kinds of obstacles and yet continues to study Chinese.









In the past three years, she has not only experienced the challenges of Covid, but also autism, social anxiety and migraines. Through all this, she has still not stopped learning Chinese, and is preparing for the Higher exam in March this year. Suffering from autism and social anxiety, during our online classes she keeps her camera off and rarely turns on the microphone, but because she practices independently, I believed she can do it. One challenge was the red recording icon during the speaking test, which would cause her to panic; an almost invisible thing for us yet insurmountable gap for her to overcome. After practicing and practising with the red recording button, she completed the speaking test smoothly and flawlessly, and got an exceptional score of full marks.

This is, of course, a colossal achievement for a person with social anxiety. In May, when all the Discovering China NQ students visited Glasgow to participate in the immersive event, I saw her happily communicating with other students, trying on traditional Chinese costumes and taking photos with everyone. It was almost impossible to tell that she is a student with autism and social anxiety and seeing this and having the privilege of following and contributing to her progress in life, I couldn't help but feel moved.

I feel happy because I work in a team that unconditionally supports and help each other. Without the joint efforts of everyone, we would not be able to achieve what we achieve.


A new semester is about to begin, and I am looking forward to the arrival of the new class with great happiness. I love teaching because it truly brings me contentment and joy!


EAST AYRSHIRE



I believe that this wonderful spring, the beautiful Chinese language will surely be a good memory for the children which will hopefully be the motivation for children to continue learning Chinese.








GRANTOWN GRAMMAR

PEN PALS WITH STUDENTS FROM YANGCUN NO.1 MIDDLE SCHOOL

To celebrate the upcoming Christmas and the Chinese New Year (the Year of the Rabbit), pupils at Grantown Grammar School had a pen pal activity with students from partner school in Tianjin. During the correspondence, we learnt about the customs of the Chinese New Year and the school life of Chinese students. We also introduced the customs of Christmas to our pen pals and wrote down the best wishes "新年好"(Happy New Year) and "圣诞快乐"(Merry Christmas) in Chinese characters. This was a great opportunity for pupils to learn about Chinese culture.

INK BLOWING PAINTING

Ink blowing painting is a modern creation technique in traditional Chinese ink painting. There is no need for a brush, just drip ink on paper and use a straw to blow it into shape, fingers or cotton buds are then used to add colours to complete the painting.

I introduced the symbolism of Chinese ink painting and plum blossom in Chinese culture, explained the techniques and tools needed for this task and demonstrated the steps in the creation process. Students were very keen when it was their turn to start painting. Each student was given a piece of paper, a straw and a cotton bud, along with some red and yellow paint. As soon as I dripped ink onto their paper, students started to blow the plum branches.

While painting the plum blossoms, students were immersed in classic Chinese music 'Three Stanzas of Plum Blossoms'. After students blew the branches, they used cotton buds to dot red petals, some also used yellow paint to dot the stamen.










CHINESE CALLIGRAPHY

S3 pupils practised traditional Chinese brush writing "Shufa" during the Mandarin group. Although for most pupils, this is their first contact with Chinese calligraphy, they have quickly gained skills: how to hold the brush correctly, apply their brush movement using the correct amount of ink and to begin to express links between harmony of motion, semantic content and 'artistic' expression.

MAKING DUMPLINGS

With S1-S3 pupils we worked with the Home Economics department in their Foodie club where we made dumplings with two kinds of filling, one with beef and one with vegetables. The pupils really enjoyed using the rolling pin to roll out the dough into a variety of shapes and making dumplings before boiling them. At the same time we made Chinese fried noodles as well. They were really proud of their achievements. "Learning about different cultures is an amazing experience and eye-opener. I loved participating in activity."

BROOMHILL PRIMARY

MANDARIN OUTREACH PROGRAMME 2022/23

Ni hao (你好) from Broomhill Primary School.

A partnership since 2019 with The Confucius Classroom Hub outreach programme at Jordanhill School provides our P5-7 pupils with an introduction to the learning of Mandarin and Chinese culture. Ms Yanshu Song, a fantastic Mandarin teacher from the Jordanhill hub, visits our school two hours a week, over the course of the school year, to deliver ten-week blocks of lessons to P5-7 pupils. Through her high-quality lessons the children make excellent progress developing skills in listening, speaking, reading and writing Mandarin. Pupils are engaged and enthusiastic throughout lessons.

Our P7 pupils who transition to Jordanhill School for their secondary education continue learning BGE Mandarin classes and can select to continue their studies for year-long NQ classes, for National 4, National 5, Higher and Advanced Higher.

Developing an understanding of Chinese culture is a key feature of Mandarin language learning. MANDARIN CLUB



BRAEHEAD PRIMARY

THE OPENING OF THE STIRLING PRIMARY CONFUCIUS GARDEN

The health and wellbeing benefits of learning out of doors are well known and this year many Confucius Classrooms have included projects on provision of outdoor spaces in their planning.

One Hub school to do just that is Braehead Primary School in Stirling. After three years of planning, design and construction, their Chinese Garden was finally opened on 4th May at an exciting event involving staff and pupils, past and present.

Pupils first began researching the elements of Chinese gardens in 2020, creating designs showing what their ideal garden space would look like. They learned that for a garden to be authentically Chinese it should include buildings, rocks, water and of course, plants. Their building was to be a pagoda but they were disappointed to learn that, for health and safety reasons, they would not be able to include a river of Koi fish. The pupils' solution was to combine the water and rock elements to create an imitation made up of painted rocks featuring beautiful Koi fish designs, which appears to run under a wooden bridge. A Moongate was another 'musthave' for the pupils, who designed an ingenious method to incorporate it into the garden without leaving it open to intruders.

Last summer, both Primary 5 classes took a trip to the Chinese Hillside at the Royal Botanical Gardens in Edinburgh to do some fact finding on Chinese plants that could cope with Scottish weather conditions and these were planted over the last few weeks before the grand opening event.



The event itself included Chinese songs from Primary 6 accompanied by Li Laoshi on the pipa, a traditional Chinese musical instrument, a Tai Chi demonstration from Primary 5 and a spectacular Lion dance by the YHGE troupe from Edinburgh.

The ribbon was cut by Mairi Breen, Braehead's former Head Teacher who was responsible for applying for the school to become one of the first Confucius Classrooms in the country, back in 2015.

Current Head Teacher, Loraine Dollard, said, "It is so lovely to see the culmination of the community, staff and children's ideas for our garden come to fruition. The Confucius Garden will be well used by our school to further promote the learning of Chinese language and culture but also mental health and wellbeing. It will provide an oasis of calm where children can take some time out and reflect."

As part of the Chinese New Year celebration, third and fourth year pupils took part in a school trip. Another first, was our participation in British Council online speaking competition, the 2023 'Chinese Bridge' Mandarin Speaking Competition for UK Schools. Our three contestants worked hard and competed enthusiastically, leavina lastina impression on the students. Several pupils participated in the individual and group rounds. One sixth year pupil, Isla it to the finals with outstanding performance in the heats.

STORNOWAY PRIMARY

During the programme, pupils learnt Mandarin phrases such as greetings, names for family members, numbers, and the days of the week.

Sandie Robb, Royal Zoological Society of Scotland (RZSS) led virtual lessons and face to face workshops, where the children learned about China, its language, culture, geography, giant pandas and other Chinese wildlife.





We celebrated our learnina at a whole school assembly, where children showcased their learning and completed dragon was shown to all the children. Confucius Hub Our classroom will he decorated with artwork and displays from January's Chinese New Year activities including the 3D dragon. Dedicated Topic boxes have been purchased, for all year groups to work from.

BEYOND THE GIANT PANDA

Beyond the Panda over this last year has continued the successful 5 week course for upper primary. Reaching schools from Ayrshire to the Outer Hebrides!

Of course, many of you will have heard the news that the giant pandas at RZSS Edinburgh Zoo will return to China at the end of this year. This is not the end of Beyond the Panda. The programme has evolved each year since 2013 and is continuing to do so. In fact, this gives Beyond the Panda a chance to go beyond the giant panda!

RZSS still holds Chinese animals at both of their sites. The new course will focus more on these animals and the habitats they live in but we also won't forget the giant panda which is still one of the most iconic Chinese animals.

The new course will be 3 weeks live virtual sessions followed by 'an expert for the day'.

'Expert for the day' is an in-person visit to the school. Outreach sessions for the class or classes who have taken part in the upper primary Mandarin course will be arranged but then additional one-off language outreach sessions can be organised for other classes including the lower primary depending on time available. Fill the day or days to suit your needs.



ROYAL ZOOLOGICAL SOCIETY OF SCOTLAND (RZSS)

Beyond the Panda has also expanded the programme beyond China with its outreaches, Giants and comparison Stripy Tails. These compare two animals different RZSS from projects conservation breeding programmes with those in China. All still offered in Mandarin but are also offered in the other associated language. For example, Giants compares the giant panda from China with the giant anteater from South America, linking Mandarin and Spanish. Stripy Tails compares the red panda from China with the ring tailed lemur from Madagascar, linking Mandarin French. These projects are for upper primary level but the sound files and some game resources have been

developed by S4-S6 students. A big thanks to students from Musselburgh Grammar for Giants and to George Watson's College for Stripy Tails. Over 2023-24, another set of students will be working on 'Cats' comparing the Pallas cat in China to the wildcat in Scotland, linking Mandarin and Gaelic. The 'Cats' programme for upper primary will launch April 2024.
